

• 18 Credit Minors:

- Interdisciplinary Minor in Sustainability and Resilience
- Applied Community and Environmental Sustainability (ACES) Minor

• 12 Credit Certificate:

Sustainability Pathway Certificate. This certificate offers students
the opportunity to schedule their general education courses with a
concentration on sustainability. To be considered for the pathway
certificate, courses must be part of the general education program,
either a distributive (e.g., behavioral and social science) or an
attribute (e.g., speaking emphasis) course.
